

Did You Know?

- You don't have to look for the number on the bottom of plastics. All plastics, except Styrofoam® and plastic bags, may be put in the recycle bin.
- There is no need to remove: paper clips, stamps, staples, metal fasteners, cellophane address windows, rubber bands, spiral bindings or plastic tabs.
- There is no need to flatten cans or remove labels.
- Metal jar lids, steel bottle caps and clean foil may be put in the recycle bin.
- Recyclables should be loose, clean and dry in your recycling bin. Do not bag your recyclables.

For Your Recycling Bin



Glass

Glass Jars and Bottles of Any Size and Color



Metal

Aluminum Cans and Foil, Metal Cans, Metal Jar Lids, Empty Aerosol Cans



Plastic

Food and Beverage Containers, including Bottles, Jars, Jugs, and Juice Cartons



Paper

All Paper, including Newspaper, Magazines, Corrugated Cardboard, Dry Food Cartons, Regular and Junk Mail, including Envelopes

Not For Your Recycling Bin

- Plastic Bags (bring them to your local retailer's collection bin)
- Styrofoam®
- Plastic Film (food wraps, dry cleaning bags)
- Liquids
- Alkaline Batteries (rechargeable batteries should be recycled at a local retailer)
- Ceramic or Pyrex Dishware
- Mirrors
- Scrap Metal (bring to a scrap metal recycler)
- Electronic Waste (bring to an electronics collection event or retailer)
- Syringes (dispose of properly at a local hospital or health facility)
- Hazardous Materials (bring to a hazardous waste collection event)

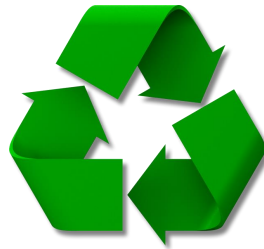
Tips

- Before you throw something in the garbage, ask yourself:
 - Can I donate this item?
 - Should I put this in my recycling bin?
 - Should this be saved for a Household Hazardous Waste and Electronics Collection Event or taken back to the retailer?
 - Can it be put in with my backyard composting?
- Flatten cardboard boxes
- Rinse residue from containers
- Recycling is good for your wallet. It costs less to recycle than to landfill or incinerate garbage.

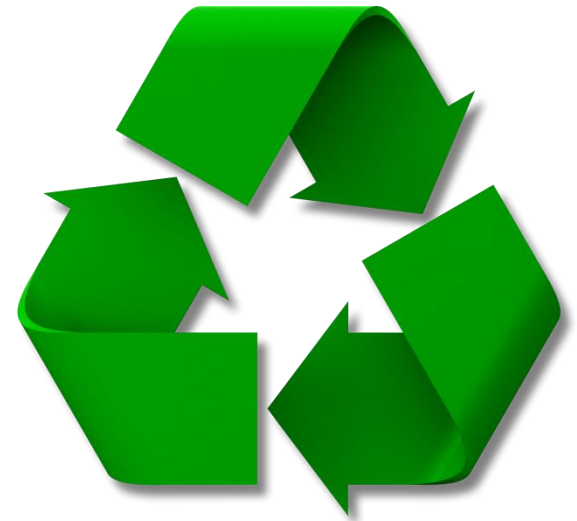
